BALLS AND STRIKES

- ♦ No. It's not a misprint. The **Senators** truly did muster up only 193 points for the week, becoming the first HSL squad during the 1999 campaign to breach the Mendoza Line. How did this happen, with the Senators' pitchers leading the league, you might ask? Good question. I'm not really sure just yet, since I haven't seen my full stats for the week, but I see my crackerjack batsmen put together a whopping total of 95 hitting points for the week. It doesn't take too many −6 outings from Todd Hundley (0-4, 2E) or −5 performances from Scott Rolen to drag the rest of the hitters down.
- ♦ The aforementioned **Senators** pitching staff leads the way with 438 points, followed closely by the **Reds** hurlers with 405, just ahead of the **Blues** arms with 396. At the other end of the galaxy, the **Red Sox** moundsmen are doing their best imitation of Tom Hanks in *A League of Their Own*, chiming in with a total of 103 points through three weeks, thanks to Chan Ho Park's crossing of the 47th Parallel and being ripped to shreds by enemy fire. Just a titch better were the **Tribe** hurlers with 159 points, a distant 122 points behind the **Cubs*** pitchers with 281. Looks like that *Pitching Means Nothing in This League* strategy is paying huge dividends for Ubelly.
- ◆ The top hitting team for the year is the *En Fuego* Chiefs with 790 batting points, just ahead of the **Tigers**'

780 and the **Cubs'*** 772. If Sean Casey, Mike Lieberthal and Carl "The Truth" Everett can keep up their current pace and all bat at least .375 for the year, the Chiefs should be in good shape. Similarly, if Matt Williams and Luis "Circus Geek" Gonzalez can continue to tear it up for the Tigers in Arizona, the Tigs have a shot at being competitive.
