Our leading point-getters this week were the Wahoos, the Tigers and the Chiefs with 396 points apiece. What are the odds of that happening? At the other end of the spectrum, Stretch's Blues crashed hard after their euphoric Week 3 total of 490 points, and were only able to muster up 212 points for Week 4.

The No. 1 starting pitcher through four weeks is Tom Glavine, the 23rd round pick of the Senators. You know, I was going to try to hold out until the 25th round, but something just told me that it was time to pick him.

Who is the biggest hitting surprise through four weeks of the season? My money is on Vinny Castilla, who has the fifth-highest total with 120 points (5.6 PPG). Mouse picked up Vinny in Round 17, just after Tirebiter snapped up Reggie Sanders, who is having a surprisingly-good year in his own right.

The biggest surprise at closer is either Benitez, who leads all pitchers with 122 points (11th round, Reds) or the ubiquitous Jose Mesa, who was not even drafted during our initial draft.
