

'BIRDS AND BUMS BEAK TO CHEEK; CHIEFS ON WARPATH; SKIPJACKS SPAWNING; WAHOOS HEADED FOR WHITE CLAY; TIGERS TOOTHLESS; TRIBE TOASTY, BUT STILL TOAST

Gentlemen:

As we move into the dog days of summer, the fierce competition between Jim Ed's **Red-birds** and Magpie's **Bums** continues to be the lead story of the Hot Stove League season. Jim's **'Birds** pecked their way to 540.9 points for the week, more than a C-note better than the **Bums**' 435.6 points, vaulting the **'Birds** back into the lead through 19 weeks of play.

And don't look now, but the **Chiefs** have battled their way into the conversation, cranking out 524.4 points for the week to cement their 3rd place position in the standings, now less than 300 points (276.9) off the lead, no longer to be ignored.

Elsewhere, the once moribund **Skipjacks** posted a league best 567.7 points for the week to bounce past the **Senators** and **Blues** and into 8th place, with their sights set on moving up even higher in the standings. And let's not forget Underbelly, whose **Tribe** posted a second-best total of 541.0 points for the week, allowing them to, sigh, remain in the cellar, but with hopes of moving out.

Bringing up the rear during Week 19 were the **Tigers** (383.4), the **Bombers** (366.2) and the (gasp) **Wahoos** (355.1), surprising no one except these three dreamers.


TOP 25 PITCHERS FOR WEEK 19

BOOK REPORT: THE BEST AND THE BRIGHTEST



I am finally almost finished with *The Best and the Brightest*, the seminal work of David Halberstam on our country's ill-advised entry into and its prolonged and painful extraction from that quagmire known as *The Vietnam War*. First published in 1969, Halberstam's 720-page masterpiece is as well-researched and thoughtfully written a book as I have happened across in a long time. Still, with more than 700 pages of small print and a surfeit of detail on the background of the war and of the bright young men of the Kennedy and Johnson administrations who were largely responsible for it, it was a bit of a slog to get through and has taken me the better part of two months to digest. But so worth it.

In *The Best and the Brightest*, Halberstam expertly defines some of the events which led to the American involvement in Vietnam:

The fall of Chiang Kai-shek's China to Mao Tse Tung and communism.

The campaign of terror led by Red-baiter Joe McCarthy, creating a chilling fear of being soft on communism.

The humiliating if not devastating experience of de Gaulle's France in Indochina.

But mostly, Halberstam attributes our disastrous experience in Vietnam to the collective mistakes and miscalculations by some of the brightest people in the country, namely: Dean Rusk, Kennedy's Secretary of State; Robert McNamara, Secretary of Defense; Mac Bundy (former Dean of Harvard), National Security Advisor to both Kennedy and Johnson; the "other" Bundy (William), Foreign Affairs Advisor; and Chester Bowles, Undersecretary of State, among others. The author concludes that these men with their remarkable collection of brain power, impressive though they were, were *too* confident, *too* used to winning, *too* accustomed to success and, as he put it, *too clever by half*, and that this is what ultimately led to the escalation of the Vietnam War from America providing advice and advisors, to the placement of American GIs in Vietnam, to surgical bombing, and ultimately, to massive bombing, to the deployment of more and more and more troops into a virtual meatgrinder in this completely unnecessary war on the Vietnamese's home turf.

After Kennedy's assassination in November 1963 and LBJ's ascension to the presidency, it is fascinating to read about LBJ's interactions and relationships with the Best and the Brightest. In one famous exchange between Johnson and his mentor Sam Rayburn--after Johnson expressed his amazement at just how bright these young turks in the Kennedy administration were--Rayburn famously exclaimed: *"Well, Lyndon, you may be right and they may be every bit as intelligent as you say, but I'd feel a whole lot better about them if just one of them had run for sheriff once."*

After LBJ was elected on his own in 1964, trouncing the ultra conservative Barry Goldwater [FN1], he began to flex his muscles and used his legendary powers of persuasion to nudge many of the Best and Brightest more and more over to his position that there was a need to unleash the unmatched force of the United States military on the North Viet Cong. In the end, the only real dissenter, and the lone consistent "No" vote, was George Ball, who later would be praised for his clear vision of what lay ahead.

Halberstam does a great job of painting the portrait of LBJ, a graduate of the Southwest Texas State Teachers College in San Marcos, who always thought himself the intellectual inferior of the Best and Brightest men, even though Johnson was in fact one of the smartest and cagiest presidents the Oval Office has ever seen. He was also one of the homeliest and the crudest [FN 2]. A couple of his salty quotes from the book are as follows:

(He) couldn't pour piss out of a boot if the instructions were written on the heel.

(About J. Edgar Hoover) Better to have him inside the tent pissing out, than outside the tent pissing in.

PERDUE STADIUM: HOME OF THE DELMARVA SHOREBIRDS

Last week while on assignment in Eastern Virginia, I made my way across the Chesapeake Bay via the 23-mile Chesapeake Bay Bridge–Tunnel, and up to Salisbury, Maryland, to take in a game between the **Delmarva Shorebirds** and the **Lakewood BlueClaws**. This (the Shorebirds) single A farm club of the Baltimore Orioles is located in the area known as the Eastern Shore. At first I was looking for the location of a town by the name of Delmarva, but then discovered that the ballpark is actually located in Salisbury, Maryland. It was only after I arrived at Perdue Stadium and toured the Eastern Shore Hall

of Fame located in that building that I realized that Delmarva stands for *Del*-aware, *Maryland*, and *Virginia*, the three-state region which supports this Shorebird team. Duh.

Anywho, I was having a fine time at the ballpark on Monday night of last week, enjoying the scenery and the atmosphere and the ballpark food, when what to my wandering eyes should appear but a Shorebird player in the on-deck circle with the name Ripken emblazoned across his back. Could it be, I thought? Well, of course, it had to be. I mean, how many other Ripkens do any of you know, anyway?



So I checked my handy Google information finder (probably not exactly the correct technical term) and learned that Ryan Ripken is a 24-year-old player for the Shorebirds, and is of course, the son of Cal Ripken, Jr., grandson of Cal Ripken, Sr., and nephew of Billy Ripken.

I was frankly surprised that Cal Ripken's son was still in Class A at the ripe old age of 24, but shortly it became apparent why. Although he looks very much like Cal Jr. in the face, it appears that Ryan inherited his athletic genes from his mother, if his general physical appearance at the plate and his unimpressive batting swing are reliable indicators. I watched as he popped up meekly in his first at-bat, then hit a seeing-eye single in his second time at the plate, only to be thrown out trying to stretch a single into a double.

Checking again with Google, Ryan Ripken played college baseball with the University of South Carolina, and then was drafted in the 20th round of the

2012 draft by the Orioles. He has gone on to post the following statistics during his rather lackluster Minor League campaign to date:
