

Champ Works the Crowd into a Lather





Centennial Field

RENAISSANCE MAN: LEONARDO DA VINCI



I am just now finishing up a book that is a very different kind of read for me, *Leonardo Da Vinci*, by Walter Isaacson. This would not normally be a book title that I would see at the book store and even think about picking up, but when I saw the name of the author, who has written several other excellent biographies that I have read, I decided that it was worth a shot. It was a good call.

Prior to opening the book, I knew almost nothing about this amazing man who lived from the year 1452 to 1519, mostly in Florence and Milan, Italy. I knew that he painted the *Mona Lisa*, as well as *The Last Supper*, and that he was known to be brilliant and a man of many different talents, but that was essentially it. A few of the remarkable things that I learned about him are as follows:



Da Vinci was born out of wedlock and was hence a bastard child, mostly raised by his mother and stepmother. However, he had a relationship with his natural father for many years which was both cordial and mutual, but his father never took the steps that he could have taken to have Leonardo "legitimized" in the eyes of the church and the community.



Leonardo was an openly gay man, who flouted his sexuality and never tried to cover it up or hide from it, even at the risk of prosecution for performing illegal acts.



Da Vinci was as intellectually curious as they come, always wanting to know what made things tick, and was always exploring "why" something was the way that it was. He spent an enormous amount of gray matter trying to understand what makes the sky blue. Literally.



With almost no formal education, Da Vinci was self-taught, primarily through analysis and experimentation. Throughout his whole life he believed that learning through doing was better than learning through reading about it. Although he eventually obtained an impressive library and read much on many subjects, his first inclination was always to think about something, experiment by taking something apart or putting something together, and learning through his own scientific process.



Da Vinci fashioned himself as a hydraulic engineer, designing and drawing up new systems for canals and waterways and sewer systems and aqueducts, most of which were never acted upon, but were recognized years later to be genius and far ahead of his time.



Da Vinci was fascinated by birds, and studied them for hours on end, trying to understand what it was about their wings and their bodies that gave them the power of flight. Based upon the knowledge that he gained from his study of birds, he designed several of his own flying machines and a helicopter, but none of them were ever used in a serious attempt at man-powered flights.



Da Vinci was a rival of Michelangelo, who was about 25 years younger than Da Vinci, but who considered himself Da Vinci's equal or superior, and who was not interested in collaborating with Da Vinci. Michelangelo was known as a loner, while Da Vinci had an abundance of friends among his fellow artists and courtesans.



For all his intellectual brilliance, he had one major flaw--he couldn't tie a ribbon on nearly anything. He left behind an astonishing number of unfinished paintings, treatises, inventions and projects, always anxious that he was to get on to the next great thing. But in every sense of the word, he was a Renaissance man. A good read.
