BOOK REPORT: To Rescue the Republic: Ulysses S. Grant, the Fragile Union, and the Crisis of 1876



I recently finished reading the above-entitled book by Fox newscaster Bret Baier, co-authored by Catherine Whitney. It is a well-researched and well-written book, and at only 337 pages, eminently readable.

The introduction to the book by Baier centered on the Insurrection of January 6, 2021, as Baier broadcast that day following the former POTUS's rant to "Stop the Steal," and Baier explained to his audience that there was zero chance that Vice President Pence could overturn the results of the election during the certification progress in Congress. Baier indicated that at that same time, he was putting his finishing touches on this book about Grant. He compared the "moment" to Grant's heroism in his final days as president when he rose to the challenge of preserving the Republic during the contested election of 1876, when violence threatened to once again catapult the nation to the point of war. The

book details the election between Republican Rutherford B. Hayes and Democrat Samuel Tilden, and the threatened constitutional crisis that was ultimately resolved by the agreement to appoint a commission to decide the contested presidency.

There were a number of things about Ulysses Grant that I learned from this book that I did not previously know, which I share with you here:

- Grant was born in Ohio in 1822, the son of an Abolitionist tanner.
- A West Point graduate, it had been Grant's preference to attend the Naval Academy. He later served in the Mexican-American War.
- Grant was not the towering figure of his Confederate counterpart, Robert E. Lee: he stood only 5-foot-8 and reportedly weighed only 135 pounds, dripping wet.
- As President, Grant boldly took on the extremely difficult and divisive task of Reconstruction, and aggressively took on the Ku Klux Klan, which was borne out of the South's desire to defy Reconstruction.

- After two terms in office, Grant declined to run for a third term, and instead went on a multi-year hero's tour of Europe. When he returned, he was talked into running for a third term as President, but was defeated in his party's primary.
- After his presidency, Grant first became wealthy through access to some sweetheart investments, and then lost everything when he was swindled by a business associate. Only the writing of his memoirs, published by Mark Twain, allowed his wife to live comfortably after his death.
