## IN PRAISE OF ASHEVI LLE AND THE TAR HEEL STATE

Last weekend I had the great good fortune of visiting the beautiful Tar Heel state of North Carolina with the amiable and inestimable Brother Sunny. We flew from Kansas City to Asheville to catch a game Friday night at historic McCormick Field; then drove to Hickory, North Carolina on Saturday for a Hickory Crawdads game at LP Frans Field; and completed the circuit on Sunday by driving to Charlotte for a Knights game against the Memphis Redbirds at Truist Field. In a word, for a baseball fan, it was FAN-tastic!


McCormick Field
McCormick Field, built in 1924, immediately soared into my top 5 list of minor league ballparks attended. Located an easy half-mile walk from downtown Asheville and carved into the surrounding Great Smoky Mountains, McCormick Field is a ballpark lover's ballpark. I can understand why Ryan McGee decided to write an entire book about his one-year internship working for the Asheville Tourists baseball club. ${ }^{1}$ So much history, and so many great features, I could devote an entire issue of From the Bullpen to it, but let me just include ten of my favorite tidbits:


The ballpark is named in honor of Dr. Lewis McCormick, a beloved physician and bacteriologist who implemented measures to contain the area's typhoid epidemic-breeding fly population, who unfortunately died before it opened. Don't ever let it be said that the guy couldn't "catch a fly."


Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig played at McCormick Field in an exhibition game, wherein Ruth supposedly said to Gehrig, "What a ballpark! Don't you smell it, Lou? Look at the honeysuckle around the outfield. What a beautiful place to play baseball!" Perhaps apocryphal, but so sweet!

On another trip to Asheville (from Knoxville) for an exhibition game, Babe Ruth took ill because of a reported excess consumption of hot dogs and had to be hospitalized and stay over for an extra day, leading to rumors about his

[^0]death and later becoming referred to as the "bellyache heard around the world."

For a three-year stretch (1956-1958) when there was no minor league baseball in Asheville, McCormick Field served as a stockcar racing venue.

Certain portions of Bull Durham were filmed at McCormick Field in 1987, including the part about Kevin Costner's character, Crash Davis, hitting his final minor league home run at this ballpark to set a record at the end of his career.

The right field fence at McCormick Field has more advertisements on it than any other ballpark that I can remember seeing, and extends to a height of almost 40 feet, making it a difficult fence to homer over even though the distance at field level is only 297 feet.

There are more concession stands at McCormick Field at which to get beer, and multiple different kinds of beer, than you can shake a stick at. Asheville is the home to many breweries and features many homemade products right there at the ballpark.

McCormick Field has sent many of its Tourist players on to play in the major leagues, from those who had a mere cup of coffee in the Show to Hall of Famers such as Willie Stargell and Eddie Murray. The late great Sparky Anderson coached the Tourists to a SAL League championship in 1968, while Cal

Sr. managed the squad from 1972-1974 while Billy and Cal Jr. served as Tourist batboys.

The winningest Tourist manager of all time was a character by the name of Joe Mikulik, who managed the team from 2000-2013, but who was best known for his unbelievable rant in 2006 when he became so incensed at an umpire's call that he ripped second base off of its mooring, carried it around the field, tossed it, and went into the dugout and started throwing around some baseball bats. After a breathtakingly beautiful drive along the picturesque Blue Ridge Parkway winding through the Great Smoky Mountains, we reached Chimney Rock State Park, a tourist mecca at

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which you can hike three quarters of a mile through the woods, and then climb 500 stairs to the summit to be treated to a spectacular view of pretty much the entire county; or take an airconditioned elevator to the top. Being the determined-some might say stubborn-old goats that we are, we sneered at the elevator option and hoofed our way up the steps to the top, and were rewarded with the view that you see below. On Tuesday night while in the Mile High City for business, I was able to take in a baseball game at Coors Field with my old grade school chum, Larry Larson. It was a perfect August night and the Braves were in town, just one night after Ronald Acuña Jr. got mugged by a determined fan who wanted a selfie. Anyway, I think that there were more Braves fans in the stands than Rockies fans, resulting in the thunderous Tomahawk Chop war whoop dominating the arena several times, to the chagrin of Rockies loyalists.

While the Rockies were able to keep the score close and only lost by the tune of $3-1$, the Braves dominated the game, rapping out a total of 15 hits and threatening to score in almost every inning.
